

## *Little church's refugee outreach bears fruit*

**A NEW drop-in centre for refugees and asylum-seekers in Drumchapel has gone from strength to strength.**

Started in February by members of the local ecumenical team, 'Friendship House' (no connection to the Milngavie Friendship House) opens on Wednesdays 10am-2pm and serves coffee and lunch.

As Drumchapel team member Jean Kerr explains, most of the regulars are from small villages in Africa and are delighted to have a meeting place.

"Can I say what lovely people they are," she said. "They cannot do enough to help in any way they can. "For the first couple of weeks, we did the cooking; now they are doing it themselves. In fact we now have a rota of cooks, who each in turn cook a traditional meal from their own country. They are teaching us how to cook African meals."

Four of the kitchen ladies were delighted to go on an Elementary Food Hygiene course last month.

But it's not only in the kitchen where the new Drumchapel residents are helping, as Jean explains: "One of the men, Moses, who attends with his wife Fatima and toddler son Suleman, asked if he could do some gardening for us. It was music to our ears!

"Moses has already dug up a large patch at the back of the church. We took him to B&Q to choose gardening tools and vegetables and we now have cabbages, parsley, rhubarb (donated by Sue Brough) and peas and strawberries (donated by Eildon) all planted, with onions and spring onions waiting to go in. Moses comes along daily to tend his garden, even when no one is there. He is so happy to have somewhere to go and get him and his family out of the house. God was surely looking after us when he sent Moses to us."

The team is getting ready for a big event on the calendar: an engagement party for Zodwa, one of the ladies. Jean and the crew are hoping for a dry day as it looks like the party could overspill from the tiny church building into the back yard.

She said: "It's to be a traditional African party with lots of food and dancing, and everyone getting involved. "Zodwa is so excited about her party: this is going to be a day in her life she never thought would happen. We are all looking forward to it and pray for sunshine in her life."

Regular activities include board games and crafts. Last month, they stocked up with wool and crochet hooks to start crochet lessons at the request of the ladies.

The group was started with outreach money given by All Saints, and has just been awarded £500 by Sport Relief in Scotland.

Jean said: "The Lord surely directed us in this outreach and they are such happy people, we just love to hear their laughter. Each one who comes in gives everyone a big cuddle, they are just so pleased to meet up with friends who care.

"We will need to apply to everywhere we can think of to keep this very worthwhile project going. Please keep us in your prayers."

# Immigrant mums work on parenting skills with MU

**THE SECRET to talking boys into eating vegetables was just one of the mysteries unveiled when Mothers' Union parenting facilitator Ann Cook was invited to work with a group of overseas mums who are new to Scotland.**

The call came from Glasgow International Christian Church, part of Heart for the City, a charity with a vision of restoring and transforming cities for the glory of God. Most members are fairly recent immigrants from Africa and India, and there are many families as well as Mothers' Union members.

Hearing that MU offers parenting groups, the members asked if a facilitator could come and help them explore their parenting and discuss their problems.

Ann, whose husband David is rector at St Michael & All Saints Helensburgh, is mother to six children, a career that must help in her role as one of four accredited parenting facilitators in Glasgow & Galloway.

Helped for some sessions by MU's Enid Scobie and Hilary Moran, she counts herself lucky to have been chosen for this mission. She found

herself among a group of enthusiastic mums who approached the weekly meetings eager to explore ideas and techniques, and ready to share their experiences and advice.

She said: "We discussed when to allow children to go to the park on their own, how to ensure that the rules your family sets are adhered to and how to persuade boys to eat vegetables (answer: develop great acting skills, lick your fingers and shriek with delight as you prepare a salad!).

## 'GORGEOUS'

"We met for seven Tuesday mornings, the presence of several small children—without exception gorgeous—only adding to the positive atmosphere.

"There was a final session with the dads (always more nerve-wracking than all the previous sessions put together!) where Hilary and I were met

with great courtesy and rapt attention, and some very perspicacious questions.

"Since most parenting groups are attended by only one parent per family, a session for partners, briefly covering the main topics discussed, is invaluable, as one of the recurrent themes of all parenting advice is consistency.

"Overall, it was a very positive experience for me, and I received not only sincere thanks, but also the promise of another group to meet with."

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## Find your 'SHAPE' for ministry

A new online tool to encourage people to explore their vocation has been launched by CPAS, the Anglican evangelical mission agency.

'Your S.H.A.P.E. for ministry' only takes a couple of minutes to complete and provides advice and a series of next steps for people who are interested in pursuing what they feel God may be calling them to, including ordination.

The online exercise at [www.cpas.org.uk/shape](http://www.cpas.org.uk/shape) poses five short questions to gauge how confidently users understand themselves in the areas of Spiritual gifts, Heart, Abilities, Personality and Experience (SHAPE).

The resultant five-sided shape is then displayed to illustrate how users perceive themselves, with a series of recommended resources and links as useful ways of further exploring each topic. Users can also get their complete SHAPE report emailed to them.

This has been created as part of CPAS' vision to encourage more under-30s to offer themselves for ordination, including pioneer ministry, although people of all ages are able to use the new web tool.

Mark Norris, CPAS leadership development adviser for vocations, said: "One of the primary aims of the SHAPE exercise is to encourage people to initiate conversations with other trusted leaders. It helps people ask how well they understand themselves in five key areas, with suggestions, resources and links of how they can develop a clearer sense of vocation.

"Helping more young people to explore their vocation assists them in their discipleship and helps them realise, whatever their vocation, that they have something to offer in the service of Christ. It is also vitally important because younger leaders are more likely to relate to contemporary culture and enable effective mission among young people."

## KNOTWEED WARNING

**THE Dean, the Very Revd Ian Barcroft, asks that any sign of Japanese knotweed on church property is immediately reported via the Diocesan Office to the Property Committee.**

It is an invasive plant that can cut through paths, roads, walls, drains and paving. It can even affect foundations.

Almost any fragment left behind from attempted clearance can regenerate the plant.

Ian said: "Due to its destructive nature many financial institutions will not lend on properties with or near Japanese knotweed.

"SEPA states that Japanese knotweed and soil containing rhizomes must be disposed of as controlled waste.

"Vestries/Trustees must exercise their responsibility in this regard."
