





Walks Down Memory Lane Part 2 -

Following the recent passing of Ella Nettlefold, we were delighted when the family handed in a folder of some of her papers, relating to the history of St Andrew's, Ardrossan. It contains her notes on the windows, plaques etc, which I am sure is information we already have. I will, though, scrutinise this archive to make sure nothing is overlooked! However, there are two little gems in this collection. The first is the St Andrew's, Ardrossan brochure, outlining the details of the Scottish Episcopal Church Stewardship Campaign of 1963. I will come back to this in the next magazine.

The second is the star of the show: a Programme dated August 1887, for a **Spanish Fancy Fair** to be held in the Assembly Rooms Ardrossan, to raise funds to build St Andrew's Parsonage (Rectory). It was a 19th Century themed event with 9 stalls

named after towns in Spain, selling a variety of goods and food. The Programme lists them all, and adds a short story at the end "The Child of the Cumbraes", written especially for this publication, by Rev J Howard Crawford.

The fair was organised by 12 Patronesses of the Parsonage Fund and the Programme contains a photographic portrait of each lady: Lady Gertrude Montgomerie, Hon Mrs Geo A Montgomerie, Lady Oxenbridge, Lady Gwendoline Chaplin, Lady Shrewsbury,

Lady Helmsley, Lady Sophia Allenby, Lady Londonderry, Mrs

Boyle, Mrs J Cuninghame, Hon Mrs Vernon and Mrs Oswald.

Several of these ladies also ran stalls. The Ladies Montgomerie, were on 'Stall Barcelona' and, dressed as "Spanish Contrebandiere", were selling "a Choice Variety of Goods from Algiers and other parts of Africa". All stalls were run by a team of ladies in Spanish dress - formal costume with mantillas and lace, or more down to earth peasants and smugglers' daughters.

The whole event looked as though it was enormous fun! There is more work to be done to transcribe the short story, establish more about the Patronesses and find out how much the Fair made! The fact that the Rectory was eventually built, is a testament to the dedicated fund raising of these and other Victorian members of St Andrew's, Ardrossan.




